Preliminary results from a large-scale National research study conducted by Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, provide independent and reliable evidence of the impact of Big Brothers Big Sisters mentors on Canada's youth. When compared with young people who have never been matched¹...

Youth who have been matched with a mentor are:

48% less likely to have behaviour problems in school.

2x

more likely to have high levels of school bonding and commitment

43% less likely to have conduct problems in school.

2x

more likely to have high academic achievement

34% less likely to allow themselves to be victimized or bullied by peers.

2 AND A HALF x

more likely to participate in extra-curricular school activities

Mentored youth simply do better.
